However, I quickly relished in learning this entirely new process, from gathering inspiration to the final screen-printing stages. While I learned the basics, I was still encouraged to experiment with colors, overlapping, and print surfaces; and though I was given assignment prompts, it was clear that the overarching objective was to take inspiration from anything and everything within our abroad experience.

This objective persisted as well in my Digital Multi-Media course. Through digital photography, video, and sound, I was assigned to explore Florence, observe and interact with it, and express my understandings (or misunderstandings) in any narrative form of my choosing. Focusing particularly on installation as a way of incorporating both technology and space, the course culminated in an exhibition at a gallery space in Florence. I exhibited *Travel Log: Tapesteria Toscana*, a semi-abstract, four-dimensional collage of my abroad travels, projected onto the sketchbook that I worked in throughout my abroad studies. Profoundly inspired by Mika Rottenberg's *Sala delle Ciminiere* that I had the privilege of visiting on a class trip to the Bologna Contemporary Art Museum, I fused sound and video from trips to Italy, France, and Germany into a fragmented representation of the exceptional sensory overload of art, history, nature, and beauty that I was flooded with throughout the semester.
